NVLSP COMMENTS

NVLSP Submits Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) Comments

On February 4, 2025 NVLSP submitted two comments on VA's proposed changes to the regulations governing the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC): one individual comment expressing NVLSP's views and one co-signed with other organizations including



the Elizabeth Dole Foundation, the Wounded Warrior Project, the Quality of Life Foundation, and Veteran Warriors. Both comments outline positive changes, remaining concerns, and suggested improvements to the new regulation. NVLSP recently launched the Family Caregiver Assistance Program, a dedicated initiative aimed at assisting veterans and their families in accessing the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)'s Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC). NVLSP Comments on Proposed Addition of Part 81 to 38 CFR Chapter I

On December 2, 2024, NVLSP submitted comments in support of VA's proposal to create a new grant program that would fund organizations assisting veterans with discharge upgrade applications. NVLSP's comments supported the creation of this new program


and encouraged VA to broaden the scope of legal services contemplated by the program and amend its criteria for receiving assistance under the program to account for pro bono programs and programs that operate fully remotely.

LITIGATION UPDATES

Supreme Court Grants Review of 9,000+ Combat-Disabled Vets Denied Full Retroactive Compensation Case



On January 17, 2025 the U.S. Supreme Court recently granted the petition for certiorari in Soto v. United States, filed by pro bono counsel Sidley Austin LLP and NVLSP. The petition was filed on behalf of Mr. Simon Soto and a class of approximately 9,000 Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard veterans who were granted Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC) by the military departments, but denied the full amount of retroactive CRSC because the military claimed that the Barring Act places a six-year ceiling on the amount it could pay in retroactive CRSC.



NVLSP Issues Updated FAQ for Navy, Marine Corps Veterans on Springs v. Del Toro

The Navy has begun issuing decisions to over 3,000 Navy



and Marine Corps veterans who are class members in litigation that challenged improper denials of medical retirement benefits. NVLSP issued an updated <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> (FAQ) guide on January 10, 2025 for veterans who have been granted or denied relief and outlines benefits and costs associated with retroactive medical retirement.

Dechert and NVLSP Appeal Denial of Medical Retirement to Fourth Circuit

On January 2, 2025, Dechert LLP and NVLSP filed a <u>brief</u> in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit in *Thompson v. Austin*, appealing the denial of medical retirement to Ms. Carissa Thompson. Ms. Thompson sustained a severe back injury in 2003 but continued serving in extreme pain until her medical separation in 2005. Despite the VA later rating her condition at 40% disabling, the military assigned only a 10% rating—below the threshold for medical retirement. As a result, she was denied retirement benefits, including monthly payments and military medical care.

NVLSP Appeals Denial of Medical Retirement for Combat Veteran to Federal Circuit

Pro Bono Counsel Latham & Watkins

NVLSP filed a <u>brief</u> in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit in *Bee v. U.S.* on December 6, 2024, appealing the denial of medical retirement to Mr. William Bee in December. Latham & Watkins serves as co-counsel alongside NVLSP. Despite sustaining Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and a traumatic brain injury (TBI) from a combat-related explosion, Mr. Bee was reassigned to non-operational roles instead of being medically retired. NVLSP argues the Board failed to apply the correct fitness standard and did not give proper consideration to his service-connected disabilities.

NVLSP IN THE NEWS

On January 31, 2025 NVLSP Co-Founder and Special Counsel, Bart Stichman, was interviewed by CBS News' Podcast: Eye on Veterans in an episode titled, "Denied full combat back pay, a Marine's case is headed to Supreme Court." The episode focuses on the
